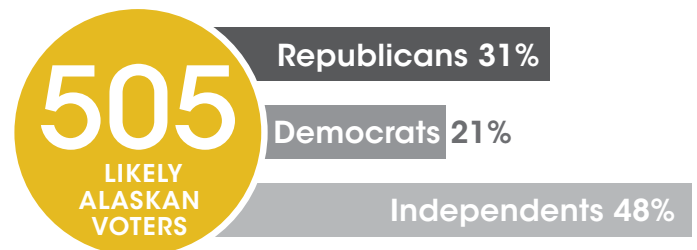

Results for this poll are based on automated telephone interviews conducted among a statewide sample of 505 likely voters in Alaska. Data for this survey research was collected by Cor Strategies Inc. The surveys were conducted September 17-19, 2018.

The margin of sampling error is plus or minus 4.36 percentage points. The margin of sampling error may be higher for certain subgroups. Results presented may not always appear to total 100 percent due to rounding.

Data was sampled using weighted demographic information from state election authorities. Demographic information for actual voters in past elections were used to construct sample target weights.
