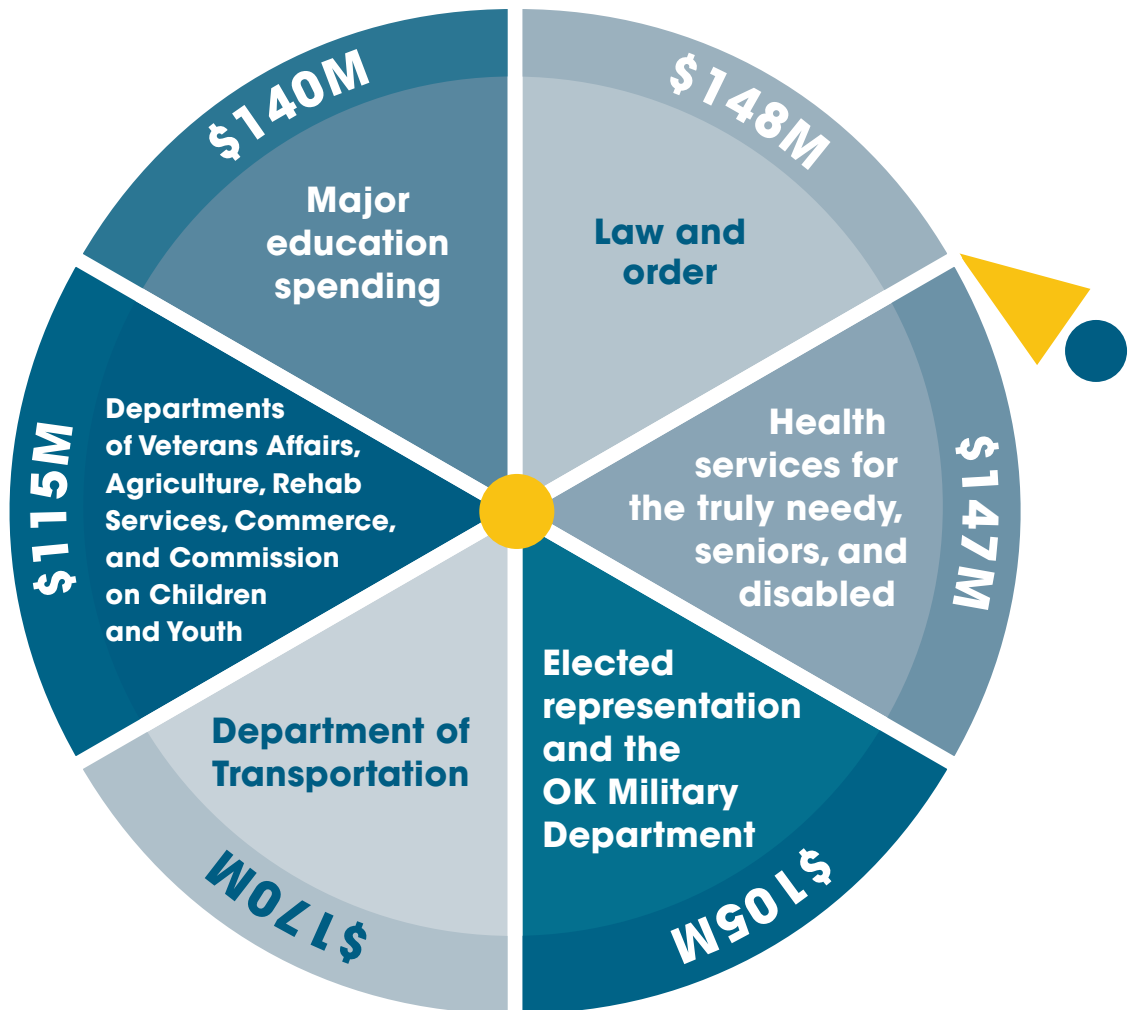




Ballot Issue 802 is Wrong for Oklahoma
